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RIDER

- 1 solid chair with arms
- 1 chair on wheels
- 1 large bookshelf (5ft to 6ft tall)
- 1 sturdy table (at least 3ft X 3ft X 4ft)
- 1 small table (or blocks) (2ft X 2ft X 4ft)
- 1 small chair (or blacks) (2ft X 4ft X 2ft)
- 1 standard lectern
- 1 Large screen (at least 4ft X 4ft)
- 2 projectors capable of projecting a slide shows during the performance
- 1 Large chalk or dry erase board (at least 4ft X 4ft)
- 1 Headset microphone (for larger venues)
- 1 Audio Visual system capable of playing digital sound files on cue
- 2 technicians to run lights and video
- Minimum of 1 hour set-up and 1 hour break down time
- Stage lighting preferred but not required



TIMING

Run time: 90 minutes without Q & A. Can be adjusted according to needs.

SPACE

Minimum of 10ft X 6ft playing space, preferably on an elevated stage.

COST

\$10,500 + travel and lodging costs for Sonny and one
Technical Director for one performance, followed by 30-60
minute discussion and Q & A. (\$5,000 for video and virtual discussion)

*Additional \$500/performance + travel, if a video technician is not provided (locally provided technicians require at least 4 hours of preparation and rehearsal)

*Discounts available for non-profit, youth-serving, and civic organizations

*Prices for additional performances or extended talkbacks or workshops negotiable.
